In his lecture, Dr. Moore will analyze six competing "logics" of sustainable architecture.

His point will be to dispel any notion that sustainable architecture can be essentialized, or associated with a single set of ideas.

*Steven Moore is an Associate Professor of Architecture and Planning at the University of Texas at Austin where he teaches design and courses related to the philosophy, history, and application of environmental technology. He is a Loeb Fellow of the Harvard Graduate School of Design. He has practiced as the design principal of Moore/Weinrich Architects in Maine and has received numerous regional and national awards for design distinction. In 1999 Moore was appointed Director of the graduate program in Sustainable Design at UT and in 2001 was co-founder of the UT Center for Sustainable Development. He has published in several journals, and his books include; *Technology and Place: Sustainable Architecture and the Blueprint Farm* (UT Press, 2001); *Sustainable Architectures: Natures and Cultures in Europe and North America*, co-edited with Simon Guy (Routledge/Spon, 2005); and *Alternative Routes to the Sustainable City: Austin, Curitiba and Frankfurt* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2006).*
